


Colonoscopy and Piles Ligation Discharge Advice

Information for Patient and Family



After the Procedure

You are advised to remain at home and rest. Due to the temporary effects of sedation, you may experience the following symptoms, which typically resolve within one day.

- You may feel dizzy, tired, nauseous and may even vomit or experience slight amnesia (unable to remember events that occurred during the procedure).
- Your judgement and reactions may be affected. For your safety and wellbeing, please keep the following in mind:
 - Arrange for a family member or friend to accompany you home after the procedure.
 - Do not drive or operate any machinery.
 - Do not take sleeping tablets and consume alcohol for the next 24 hours.
 - Avoid making commitments that may have significant consequences, such as signing any legal document or making important decisions.

Post Colonoscopy

- You may feel bloated and experience abdominal cramps. These symptoms usually wear off after 1 day.
- You may experience minor incontinence or loose stools for a few days due to the bowel preparation used before the procedure.
- Colonoscopy clips may be used to prevent bleeding. If these clips were inserted during your procedure, they will remain in place for several weeks before falling off and being passed out of your body.

Post Piles Ligation

- You may have slight rectal bleeding. This is typically very minimal (less than a tablespoon) and should stop within 1 to 2 days.
- You may also experience discomfort at the anal region and the urge to pass motion. This usually wears off after 2 to 3 days. Do not strain during your bowel movement.

Dietary Advice

A soft diet is recommended after the procedure. Please avoid greasy or spicy food for 1 day. You may gradually return to your normal diet as you feel comfortable.

For Piles Ligation

- Eat more high-fibre food such as vegetables, fruits and whole grains.
- Do not take any anticoagulation medications, such as Aspirin or Warfarin. Please seek and follow your doctor's advice if you are taking these medications.

When To Seek Medical Help

Go to the Emergency Department immediately if you experience any of these symptoms:

- Breathing difficulty
- Excessive bleeding or passing of black stools
- Severe abdominal pain
- Severe bloating
- Severe chest pain
- Vomiting or feeling nauseous
- Injection site is swollen and inflamed
- Increased pain or bleeding, having difficulty in urinating and Upper Respiratory Tract Infection (URTI) symptoms (for Piles Ligation)
