Migrant Workers: Education on Industrial Accidents in Singapore

Migrant Workers

Migrant workers (MW) are individuals who depart from their home country in search of employment opportunities in another nation. These workers come from countries such as Bangladesh, China, India, and Myanmar.

Industrial Accidents

Common types of injuries include:

- Equipment rollovers
- Falls from height
- Struck by heavy equipment
- Caught in machinery
- Crushed or struck by a collapsing structure
- Road traffic accident during working hours

Examples of Road Traffic Accident during working hours

- Suffered a traffic accident while using company transportation between home and workplace. The vehicle is not a public transport.
- Involved in a traffic accident while traveling for work-related purposes, regardless of the mode of transport, without making any personal detours.

(E.g. Travelling for work-related purposes, such as commuting from the workplace to a meeting venue.)



Work Injury Compensation Act (WICA)

Eligible Employees can claim for work-related injuries under three main types of compensation:

- **1. Medical Leave Wages:** Employers are responsible for paying wages for the days covered by medical certificates (MCs) when hospitalisation leave (HL) or light duty is granted by a Singapore-registered doctor or dentist.
- **2. Medical Expenses:** Employers are required to cover medical expenses related to a work accident up to a maximum limit of \$45,000 or within one year from the date of the accident.
- **3. Lump Sum Compensation:** In cases of permanent incapacity, current incapacity, or death, you or your family can claim a lump sum compensation.

If you are a Work Permit or S Pass holder, your employer must cover medical expenses that exceed the coverage of the Work Injury Compensation Act (WICA) under the Employment of Foreign Manpower Act.

What are examples of the eligible medical expenses that employers will cover?

- Medical consultation
- Ward charges
- Treatment fees
- Emergency medical transport (E.g. Ambulance)
- Cost of medicines
- Artificial limbs
- Surgical appliances
- Dental charges



I was involved in an industrial accident. What are my next steps?

Medical Care

You will be brought to the hospital's Emergency Department to receive immediate medical assistance and treatments from the doctors.

Medical Expenses

All medical bills will be covered by your employer according to the Work Injury Compensation Act.

Workers do not need to worry about finances and hospital bills when they meet with any industrial injuries. Employers and WICA will be responsible in ensuring that workers get compensated accordingly and rightfully.

Standard of care for all our patients remain as a top priority whether they are Singapore citizens, Permanent residents, Migrant workers or visitors.

To obtain more information and specifics regarding the financial and social assistance available, the medical team, medical social worker, and finance department will coordinate with the patient's employer to optimise the support accessible to every migrant worker.

Accidents that are not work-related injuries will not be covered by WICA and employers.

Non-work-related injuries, such as the examples provided, are not covered by WICA.

• Road Traffic Accident

- 1. Traffic accident while travelling in your own car, your friend's car or public transport between home and workplace.
- 2. Meet with a traffic accident while making a personal detour during work regardless of the mode of transport.

(E.g. detour for personal errand while travelling from workplace to venue for meeting)



Social Activities

1. Injuries sustained under the influence of alcohol or a prescription drug which was not prescribed by a doctor.



• Sports and Leisure Activities

1. Injuries sustained while participating in sports or recreational activities that are not part of the employee's job duties or organised by employer for work purposes.





NUH Return-To-Work (RTW) Programme

The main goal of the Return to Work (RTW) Programme is to offer assistance to our injured workers and help them return to work safely. This programme is provided at no cost as long as they are covered by the Work Injury Compensation Act (WICA).

The RTW programme comprises the following components:

- 1. Evaluation to determine the worker's capabilities at work while injured.
- 2. Coordination with doctors and healthcare professionals to evaluate the worker's condition.
- 3. Worksite visits (if necessary).
- 4. Suggestions for modified work duties.
- 5. Personalised RTW plan and training to prevent re-injury at work.

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Overall Patient Journey after an Industrial Accident

START

- 1. Employee sustains injuries while at work.
- Seek medical assistance immediately
- Inform employer

- 2. Employers will need to notify MOM and report accident.
- WICA is immediately processed
- Arrange for treatment and issue a Letter of Guarantee (LOG).



- Provide MC, HL or light duty according to medical condition
- 4. Employer pays for medical expenses.
- Employer is responsible for all medical bills, surgeries, treatments and medication
- Pay Medical Leave wages to employee





5. Employee is discharged.

- Employer may arrange suitable Return-to-work duties to employee
- Employer will ensure employee receives compensation within 21 days if no objection is raised
- Employee will continue to receive salary on the days that they are on MC or HL
